Silos, Spires and Soaring Birds – a Lebanon Valley Skyline

Two scenic rides start from the Visitors Center at the Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area. For cyclists who want to pedal more miles, it is possible to combine both rides and enjoy 50 miles of bicycling. Visiting the Pennsylvania Game Commission's exhibits, hiking and "bird watching" are activities available at Middle Creek. For additional information visit www.pgc.state.pa.us

This scenic route is a countryside ride that skirts the towns. Silos of diverse ages and sizes denote the significance of the Lebanon Valley's family dairy farms. Cyclists pedal by thousands of acres of corn, soybeans and alfalfa. Amish are an integral part of the communities. In summer months, white egrets and blue heron stalk their prey along the creeks that you cycle by. Migrating Canadian and snow geese, ducks and trumpeter swans rely on farmers' fields for sustenance during their stopovers at Middle Creek. If you cycle in this area in the Fall or late Winter, you can enjoy the sights and sounds of these birds as they soar above you. Make this destination for cycling a year round choice.

There can be no cycling in Lebanon County without discovering historical sites; on this ride, 18th and early 19th century cemeteries, churches and homesteads will compose part of the scenery and provide opportunities to dismount and explore.



Heinrich Zeller house, known as Fort Zeller, was built in 1723 and revised in 1743. Zeller was from the Alsatian region of France, and the home reflects an Alsatian/Swiss appearance. It served as a "fort" during Indian raids.

Caspar Wistar in 1727 provided 100 acres for the church, and the price was an annual red rose for Wistar's descendents.

Millbach is a lovely area along the Millbach (Millcreek) with 18th and early 19th century homes. St. Paul's United Church of Christ was built in 1790. From 1747, prior places of worship at this site were constructed of log and frame.

The House of the Miller was built in 1752 of limestone and sandstone. In 1784, the son attached a stone grist mill to the house. Several rooms were removed in 1927 to the Philadelphia Museum of Art. The furnishings showed a strong German influence.

The Illick home is a Georgian structure with an outstanding bank barn. Capt. Batdorf married Emma Illick. Upon his return after the Civil War, he added columns similar to those he had seen on significant southern homes.

While you cycle this scenic route, you may come upon Amish families at work in their fields, their businesses, and at their homes. Their lifestyle enables you to have a momentary feeling of having slipped into the distant past.

^{*}If at 1.1 mile, T307 (unmarked) is closed due to the Game Commission's protection of the migratory birds, the alternative route is to continue on Hopeland Road 1.3 miles to SR 897 in Kleinfeltersville. Exercise extreme caution as you turn right on to SR 897, continue for .2 of a mile and turn left on to Mountain Road. You will now be on the regular route.
